Regents' Policy Manual - Section 2.1: Free Expression and Advocacy

Adopted Date: 09-12-1996

Applicability

This policy applies to all members of the University community: Regents, faculty, students, staff, and visitors.

University Principles

Freedom of inquiry and freedom of expression, both advocacy and dissent, are indispensable elements of a university. The freedom to engage in advocacy and to express dissent by lawful means, including peaceable assembly and the right of petition, is as important on a university campus as elsewhere in our society. The Regents have protected and defended and will continue to protect and defend the academic freedom of all members of the University community.

The exercise of the freedom of expression, however, must be balanced with the rights of others to learn, work, conduct business, and engage in other legitimate University functions and activities.

Policy

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The Regents recognize and approve the right of free speech and honest expression of opinion on any subject by any member of the University community, subject only to reasonable viewpoint-neutral rules that apply uniformly and do not discriminate among content or points of view.

The University's commitment to free expression and advocacy does not extend to speech or conduct that violates the law or University policy, including targeted speech that constitutes prohibited conduct such as bullying or harassment¹, defamation, destruction of or damage to property, discrimination, violence or threats. More specifically, the Regents, with this Policy,

¹ Bullying or harassing do not include constitutionally protected activity or conduct that serves a legitimate purpose.

condemn such prohibited conduct and condemn conduct that includes discriminatory, stereotypical, and derogatory speech targeted at one or more students an-individuals based upon their actual or perceived shared ancestry or ethnic characteristics, citizenship, or residency in a country with a dominant religion or distinct religious identity.

Those who speak or act shall not do so in the name of the University or any of its organizations unless <u>authorized</u> there has been specific authorization to do so. The <u>President of the University President</u>, as its <u>Chief chief Executive executive Officerofficer</u>, is authorized by the Board of Regents to be the primary spokesperson for the University. The <u>President of the Board of Regents President</u> is authorized to speak officially on behalf of the Board.

Implementation

The <u>University</u> President of the <u>University</u> shall develop <u>content and</u> viewpoint-neutral administrative policies and procedures for free expression and advocacy on <u>University grounds</u>.
